DISTRICT OVERVIEW

Bismarck Public Schools is the largest school district in the state, with 13,483 students on the first day of 2021-22 and 2,169 employees. We have over 500 classrooms in 18 grade schools, 3 middle schools, 3 senior high schools, an alternative high school, a Career Academy and Technical Center, and an early childhood education program (BECEP).

BPS has a strong graduation rate. The average daily attendance was 94% in 2021-22. All BPS schools are "accredited with commendation" by the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction and North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Some schools have received "Blue Ribbon" awards, a high national honor.

Bismarck Public Schools requires 24 credits to graduate from high school; 18% of students in grades 10-12 are members of the National Honor Society, and 16% of the seniors are Presidential Academic Fitness Award winners, maintaining an A- or higher GPA and score at the 85th percentile or above on a national achievement test.

BISMARCK PUBLIC SCHOOLS 2021/22

Growth is an ongoing reality within the Bimarck Public Schools district. The Bismarck area has experienced significant population growth in recent years, which is evident when looking at school enrollment trends. Past school years have seen the district welcome a record-breaking number of students, and projections indicate that trend will continue in the future. At the time of writing, BPS has opened two additional elementary schools to help accommodate the increase in students. While this growth is exciting, it also poses new challenges and needs that the district must strategically address.

During the 2021-2022 school year the district met a number of important goals in furtherance of its Mission of "Empowering every learner to thrive." BPS compared favorably with state-wide measurements such as cost-to-educate, standardized testing, and other important indicators. Additionally, evident within this report is the high quality of staff members employed by the district. When examining staff data, one will notice that BPS is fortunate to have a wealth of seasoned educators on its team, many of whom possess advanced credentials.

As we prepare for the challenges of the 21st century workforce, we look forward to equipping our students with the tools they need to prosper.

BISMARCK PUBLIC SCHOOLS SNAPSHOT

BPS BY THE NUMBERS

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT: We are the largest district in the state. Quarter One enrollment in '21-'22 was 6,241 in elementary, 3,178 in middle, and 4,064 in high school. (13,483 overall)

PROGRAM ENROLLMENT: Open day student enrollment in '21-'22 was 295 in pre-K/BECEP. Throughout the school year, 479 learners were served at the Adult Learning Center.


Almost a third (30%) of BPS high school students were enrolled in classes within the Career Academy and Technical Center. In addition to BPS students, the Career Academy also provides services to Mandan, Wilton, St Mary's, Shiloh Christian School, St. Mary's and home school students.

CLASS SIZE: The average class size in '21-22 for elementary was 19.9, 6-8th was 26.1 9-12th was 22.1.


FACILITIES: BPS operated out of 27 buildings, 16 elementary schools, 3 middle schools, 3 high schools, 1 alternative school, the Early Childhood Center, the Career Academy and Technical Center, Facilities & Transportation and the Hughes Educational Center for administration.


ATTENDANCE: The average attendance rate was 94%, compared to a state average of 93%.


BPS STAFF

BPS was the 3rd largest employer in Bismarck with a total of 2,168 employees. This included 1,100 teachers, and 1,068 support staff and administrators.


Years of Experience: Of the 2022 BPS educators, 71% have at least 5+ years of experience.

Years of Education: Of the 2022 BPS educators, 23% have a Bachelors degree and 56% have an advanced degree (masters or doctorate degree).














MILL RATES

A mill rate is a calculation used to determine your property taxes. One mill is 0.1 cent or one one-thousandth of a dollar. A mill rate of 1 means you pay 1\$ in taxes for every %1000 of your property's assessed value. A homeowner in Bismarck could expect to pay \$482/year per \$100,000 of their home's assessed value.

BPSFOUNDATION

ABOUT BPSF

The Bismarck Public Schools Foundation mission is to assist the Bismarck Public Schools in their mission to empower every leaner to thrive by enhancing the services and recognition of students and staff.

Some of the main ways that the BPS Foundation works to achieve this goal is through facilitating programs and scholarships that directly impact our students. In the 2021/22 school year, BPS Foundation was able to provide over \$157,000 in grant funding to BPS and over \$42,000 in scholarships to deserving students.



In addition, over \$205,000 was raised in the 2021/22 school year alone for the following programs:







Gallons of Gratitude- Tri-Energy Cooperative sets aside a portion of all sales at their Cenex-branded stations to support our teachers. Over \$160,000 was provided in 21/22, which equated to each teacher receiving \$140 in funds to enhance their classrooms. To date, Tri-Energy Cooperative has donated over \$325,000 through this initiative.

Fill the Bus- IHeart Media and Red Carpet carwash partner for this special event which provides school supplies and funding to the BPS/BPSF and surrounding communities for students in need. In 21/22, almost \$20,000 was raised along with 2 buses full of supplies, allowing us to meet all identified needs.

Kids' Kicks- Scheels and Townsquare Media partner with BPS/BPSF to raise funds for the purchase of cold weather gear needs for students within the Bismarck Public Schools. In 21/22, over \$7,800 was raised and every identified cold weather need was met.

BPS Family Assistance Fund- This fund was established in 2020 to aid BPS students and their families for needs in which no other community support can fulfill. Examples of use may be to help cover a medical bill or past due rent. In 2021/22 almost \$18,000 was raised for this program.
